Erste Vorlesung: 17. April 2012

2012 marks the 200th birthday of Charles Dickens, one of the greatest writers of the nineteenth century. In the context of the “Dickens 200” semester at the English department, an introduction to Dickens’s works for German students seems particularly apposite. The German reception of Dickens has largely focused on a limited range of aspects, and it is important to see beyond these limitations. We will appreciate the fascination and the beauty of Dickens’s writing, the amazing things he could do with the English language. At the same time, we will see that Dickens’s works offer a cultural history of Britain in the early and mid-nineteenth century.

Texts:

The following works of Charles Dickens will be discussed: *Sketches by Boz*, *Pickwick Papers*, *Oliver Twist*, *A Christmas Carol* / *The Chimes*, *Dombey and Son*, *David Copperfield*, *Bleak House*, *Hard Times*, *Little Dorrit*, *A Tale of Two Cities*, *Great Expectations*, *Our Mutual Friend*, *The Mystery of Edwin Drood*.

There are many editions of these texts available; among the best series are the Penguin Classics, the Oxford World’s Classics and the Norton editions. The Wordsworth editions are not as good as the other three, but they are a bit cheaper (usually 6 to 7 Euros) and in this way more student-friendly. Please avoid the Penguin Popular Classics editions – they cannot even be quoted in papers. (At the same time, it is of course true that the question of the right edition is less important than the fact that you actually do read the books.)

Walter Bagehot’s dictum that Dickens was London’s “special correspondent for posterity” is routinely quoted in 2012, the year of Dickens’s bicentenary. This colloquium seeks to explore the relationship between Dickens, i.e., his writings, and “his” city, even though he wasn’t born in it. We will also consider Portsmouth, and perhaps Rochester, as cities that influenced Dickens. We will read, among other texts, passages from *Sketches by Boz*, *Oliver Twist*, *Bleak House*, *The Uncommercial Traveller* and *Our Mutual Friend*.

Erste Sitzung nach dem Blockseminar: 24. April 2012

Vor und in Examina stehende Studierende erhalten Gelegenheit, sich auf die Examenssituation vorzubereiten, indem sie sich in examensrelevante Themen einarbeiten, diese im Plenum vorstellen und Probleme diskutieren. Das Kolloquium wird in den fachlichen Teilen auf Englisch, in den Diskussionen über formale Aspekte auf Deutsch abgehalten.

Das Format des Blockseminars wurde zusammen mit Studierenden entwickelt und dient dazu, den StaatsexamenskandidatInnen (und nicht nur diesen) unmittelbar vor Beginn des ihres Prüfungsblocks eine fokussierte Rückmeldung zu ihren jeweiligen Themen zu geben und eventuelle Probleme zu erörtern. Nach dem Blockseminar finden über die Vorlesungszeit verteilt einzelne Sitzungen statt, in denen auf spezifische Bedarfe eingegangen wird und in denen BA- und MA-KandidatInnen den Stand ihrer Arbeiten vorstellen sollen.

Hauptseminar: Dickens Now: Adaptations and Revisions

Charles Dickens's novels are counted among the masterpieces of British literature; many of his literary characters such as Ebenezer Scrooge, Oliver Twist and Little Nell have found their place in British cultural memory, as has indeed Dickens himself. In this seminar, which is part of our "Dickens 200" semester, we will discuss Dickens's novels Oliver Twist and Great Expectations, as well as recent filmic & literary adaptations of these books – among them Lloyd Jones's Mister Pip (2006). We will also Richard Flanagan's fictional Dickens biography Wanting (2008) and short excerpts from Peter Ackroyd's Dickens (1990) and Michael Slater's Charles Dickens (2009). Our focus will not only be on Dickens's works and their rewritings, but we will also critically discuss the engagement of 21st-century culture with one of the most successful writers of the nineteenth century.

We will start with discussing Oliver Twist; students who want to take this seminar should have finished reading the novel by the second week of the semester at the very latest. Students should indeed start reading the texts by Dickens, Jones and Flanagan as soon as possible. Excerpts from Ackroyd's Dickens and Slater's Charles Dickens will be made available at the beginning of term.

In order to attend this course, students must register before the beginning of term. The number of participants is strictly restricted to 33 people. Registration is via CLIX only. Proseminar: Charles Dickens: *Dombey and Son*

Dombey and Son (serialized between October 1846 and April 1848) is one of the almost unknown Dickens masterpieces, at least among students in Germany. In the context of our "Dickens 200" semester, this seminar is a modest effort to change this. We will closely read passages of this panoramic novel of a dysfunctional family, i.e., we will analyze it in order to develop a thorough understanding both of single episodes and of the narrative whole. We will also contextualize *Dombey and Son* within the 1840s, a decade that was marked for instance by social tensions, caused by a ruthless market 'liberalism', and the railway boom, both of which are addressed in *Dombey and Son*.

In the third meeting, there will be a test on *Dombey and Son*. You will pass this test effortlessly if you have read the novel.
