The position is located in Project A6 (PIs: Axel Mecklinger & Regine Bader) of the <u>Collaborative Research</u> <u>Center 1102 "Information Density and Linguistic Encoding"</u>. The overarching research question the CRC addresses is to what extent Information Theory can contribute to a unifying model of language use, variation and change. Project A6 uses behavioral and electrophysiological measures to investigate how expectancy-based mechanisms in natural language contexts modulate learning and memory processes.

The successful candidate should have a very good Master degree in psychology, neuroscience or a related program.
